### Turn it off. Turn it down. Turn energy savings into dollars in your wallet.

Conserving energy means you're conserving money for other things, like business repairs and staffing. Try some of these easy ways to save energy throughout your business.

### **QUICK ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIPS**

- 1. Sign up for an energy assessment
- 2. Install programmable thermostats and program them for business hours
- 3. Upgrade interior and exterior lighting to LED with controls
- 4. Perform regular maintenance (every 6 months) on HVAC and refrigeration equipment
- 5. Replace HVAC filters every month during the heating season
- 6. Lower hot water heater temperature, insulate hot water piping, and install high-efficiency sink aerators and spray rinse valves
- 7. Check for air leaks seal gaps, replace gaskets and door sweeps, and insulate where possible
- 8. Turn off electronics using smart power strips

### **TIPS TO REDUCE PEAK DEMAND**

- 1. Learn how your business uses energy (equipment, schedules, seasons) through an energy assessment or free energy advising from Efficiency Works
- 2. Upgrade to more efficient equipment (LED lighting and controls, motors and fan controls, higher-efficiency refrigeration equipment)
- 3. Upgrade and downsize HVAC equipment (after lighting upgrades) as this equipment is often oversized for the space and has a higher demand than appropriately-sized equipment
- 4. Reschedule loads, if possible, and build in staged operations so that not all equipment comes on at the same time (duty cycling)
- 5. Consider on-site renewable energy generation to offset demand

### Don't wash money down the drain!

Water is an especially precious resource here in the West. When it comes to conserving water, small adjustments can save gallons and dollars! Put some of these practices into play to reduce water use at your business.

### **OUICK WATER USE TIPS**

- 1. Conduct a water assesment
- 2. Check for leaks indoors and outdoors
- 3. Upgrade old toilets and urinals
- 4. Upgrade indoor fixtures (e.g., aerators, pre-rinse spray valves, showerheads)
- 5. Conduct an outdoor sprinkler inspection
- 6. Plant water-wise landscaping that is made for Colorado summers.
- 7. Maintenance matters: hire contractors that understand waterwise landscapes
- 8. Improve cooling tower efficiency

### Less waste, more savings.

Reducing waste not only reduces your impact on the environment, but it can also save you money. Using reusable items, buying in bulk, and composting keeps dollars in your wallet while also lessening what gets tossed out.

### **OUICK WASTE REDUCTION AND RECYCLING TIPS**

### **Reduce Waste**

- 1. Reduce printing, change to electronic billing, e-signatures, and set printers to double-sided
- 2. Regularly update your mailing list and implement envelope free marketing
- 3. Encourage employees to use reusable or compostable lunch bags, food containers, beverage containers, coffee mugs, cutlery, and shopping bags
- 4. Offer products with minimal packaging or utilize packaging that can be recycled, reused, or composted
- 5. Eliminate the use of polystyrene (Styrofoam) cups and takeout containers in favor of a more compostable or recyclable option
- 6. Reuse packaging and shipping materials such as boxes, envelopes, and packing materials.
- 7. Use reusable rather than disposable products dishes, towels, boxes, bags, or containers
- 8. Prohibit littering at the workplace, specifically target smoking areas. Store, label, and properly dispose of all hazardous materials.
- 9. Compost!

### **Recycling 101**

- 1. To start, take a simple visual inventory of the materials your business throws away. Remember that steel, aluminum, glass, cardboard, paper, plastics, and colored plastic containers are all recyclable.
- 2. Offer plastic bag or other packaging and product recycling for your customers
- 3. Recycle electronic waste
- 4. Recycle used cooking oil
- 5. Recycle building materials during renovation or construction of the buildings
- 6. Install signs and give instructions on recycling to staff
- 7. Provide recycling containers and adequate signage for your employees, in food areas, and for customers/clients
- 8. Provide incentives. Rewarding employees for their efforts and successes makes it more likely that they will continue the same behaviors

### **QUICK SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION TIPS**

- 1. Purchase materials and supplies locally to reduce transportation emissions
- 2. <u>Implement policies/practices to encourage employee walking, biking, carpooling, transit, and/or telecommuting</u>
- 3. Install bicycle parking and amenities such as changing rooms and showers
- 4. Provide an incentive or reimburse employee travel on public transportation or alternative transportation
- 5. Use teleconferences or web conferences rather than traveling for face-to-face meetings
- 6. Recycle all vehicle fluids
- 7. Establish an anti-idling policy at the facility and during deliveries
- 8. Use hybrid, electric, or alternative fuel vehicles/fleet cars
- 9. Provide preferred parking for employees who carpool
- 10. Buy locally

- 1. Donate in-kind items and time to non-profits or <u>a tree</u>
- 2. Volunteer with the City of Longmont's Parks, Open Space & Trails division
- 3. Donate food to local shelters and non-profits
- 4. Consider adopting a business code of ethics that will outline employee conduct on ethics, values, environment, diversity, employee respect, and customer service
- 5. Try to follow a health and safety program. With the pandemic, it is more than necessary to ensure you are compliant with government legislation on health and safety to protect your employees and prevent accidents and injuries
- 6. Ensure your suppliers know and meet your expectations of responsible behavior regarding issues such as fair pricing
- 7. Encourage your employees to volunteer in the community
- 8. Have your employees and yourself commit to protecting the environment
