2024 RATES ALSO INCLUDE CHANGES FOR EVS

New electric rates start this month

ongmont's utility rates have been updated for 2024, including new electric rates that were adopted by the Longmont City Council in October and increased support for income-qualified households through Longmont CAReS.

The revised rates remain comparable to other Front Range communities. For a typical household, this will mean an additional \$5.16 per month in electric costs, along with \$7.92 per month in other utility costs that were previously adopted in 2022 or earlier, such as the water rate. Residents will see the rate changes reflected in bills they receive this month for their January use, and in the seasonal electric rate this summer.

Rebate programs available to offset increase costs

The new electric rates will:

- Account for increasing wholesale electric costs, and as well as needed maintenance, operational, and improvement costs for the LPC electric grid.
- Help fund the continuing efforts of Longmont Power & Communications and Platte River Power Authority, our wholesale power provider, to progress toward the 100% renewable electric energy goal by 2030, as directed by the City Council.

INCREASED REBATES OFFERED

To help offset the rate change, the City has also increased the rebates available through Longmont CAReS for qualifying residents. Find out more about the program and how to qualify at longmontcolorado.gov/longmontcares.

UNIVERSAL RECYCLING AND PLASTIC POLLUTION REDUCTION

Longmont's Universal Recycling Ordinance (URO) and the State's Plastic Pollution Reduction Act (HB21-1162) have both started implementation on Jan. 1, 2024. The URO requires recycling collection services for commercial businesses and multifamily properties. Financial assistance is available to help both commercial and multifamily property owners comply. Also, the next phase of Colorado's Plastic Pollution Reduction Act has taken effect, banning single-use plastic bags at large grocery, convenience, and retail stores and banning polystyrene foam takeout containers and cups.
